Weather Guesser Nunataks

At our Board meeting [Old Antarctic Explorers Association] on Saturday, Russ White mentioned that while he was on the Ice during the 1965-66 summer, ASA assigned him to an Ellsworth Traverse with 5 USARPs. He was a Navy Aerographer's Mate, and his job as a member of the expedition was to report the weather whenever they stopped. Through that interaction with the USARPs, he was given the opportunity to have an Antarctic terrain feature named for him. Since there were already enough white mountains on the continent already, he suggested they call one "Weather Guesser."
